GOALS OF THE STAR PRENATAL CLINIC

The goals of the STAR prenatal clinic at OUHSC are to provide:

- Comprehensive specialized prenatal care for women with substance use disorders in pregnancy,
 - in a collaborative environment,
 - with an emphasis on coordination of care with supportive psychosocial services and substance use treatment providers.



WHAT YOU'LL FIND AT THE STAR PRENATAL CLINIC

Located within the high-risk OB clinic at OU Health (Prenatal Diagnostic Center), at the Oklahoma Children's Hospital





WHAT YOU'LL FIND AT THE STAR PRENATAL CLINIC

We provide:

- · Full prenatal care by Maternal-Fetal Medicine specialists
- · Specialized OB ultrasound
- In-clinic dedicated Social Worker
- Coordination of care plan with substance use treatment and behavioral health providers
- Group education sessions (currently on hold)
- Peer recovery support specialists
- Delivery and postpartum care services at OU Health/Oklahoma Children's Hospital



OVERVIEW OF AN INITIAL VISIT AT THE STAR PRENATAL CLINIC

- Specialized OB ultrasound with interpretation and counseling
- Prenatal visit
- Discussion of medical/obstetrical history, substance use history, goals of treatment
- Evidence-based prenatal care with creation of an individualized plan for each patient's pregnancy
- Meeting/intake with Social Work team
- Assess psychosocial needs and provide resources as needed
- Establish plans for substance use treatment and mental health services with community provider



OVERVIEW OF A RETURN VISIT AT THE STAR PRENATAL CLINIC

- · Follow up ultrasound exams for fetal growth, biophysical profiles as needed
- · Prenatal visit
 - Continue with full prenatal care
 - Management of any other maternal and fetal comorbidities including diabetes, hypertension, fetal congenital birth defects
 - · Delivery planning
 - Postpartum pain management plan
 - · Contraception counseling
 - Coordination of care with substance use treatment providers as needed
- · Visit with Social Work team
 - Continue to address psychosocial needs
 - Establish and reinforce plans to continue with treatment and recovery after pregnancy



HOW TO REFER PATIENTS TO THE STAR PRENATAL CLINIC

- Screen all pregnant patients for substance use disorders (SUD)
- Validated screening tools include NIDA Quick Screen, 5 P's



HOW TO REFER PATIENTS TO THE STAR PRENATAL CLINIC


- When a pregnant person with SUD is identified, send referral to the OU Health Prenatal Diagnostic Center and specify referral for the STAR Prenatal Clinic

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About WIC


- Special Supplemental Program for Women Infants and Children is a federal grant program

Participation Requirements


- Family income ≤185% of the poverty level or participation in certain eligible programs
- Live in Oklahoma
- · Have at least one documented nutrition risk



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



Mission

Parents as Teachers promotes the optimal early development, learning and health of children by supporting and engaging their parents and caregivers.

Approach

The Parents as Teachers approach is to partner, facilitate and reflect. This is done at every level of the organization, from a parent educator visiting a family in their home, all the way to the work of the national center.



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Parents as Teachers

- Target Population
- Low incomes
- Beyond the 28th week of their first pregnancy
- Not yet 21 years of age
- History of maltreatment and interaction with child welfare
- History or issues with substance abuse
- History of mental illness or currently have an untreated mental illness
- History of or issues related to domestic violence
- User of tobacco products
- Have developmental delays, disabilities or low educational achievement
- Active military members or those returning from military service.




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Parents as Teachers

- **■** Eligibility Requirements
- The Primary Caregiver is prenatal, or has a child between birth and kindergarten completion
- All first-time mothers who are prenatal; before the 28th week mothers are referred to Children First (C-1). If services are unavailable, or the parent prefers PAT, the site may enroll that family
- Family resides in the service area.

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
