

What is a peer counselor?

- Paraprofessional
- Recruited and hired from the target population
- Available outside usual clinic hours





Role of the Peer Counselor

- Support
- Help prevent and manage common concerns
- Make referrals
- Complement care





Basic Job Duties of Peer Counselors

- Contact moms at critical intervals
- Help with classes
- Help with support groups





Defined Scope of Practice

- Simple
 - Basic information
 - Support
 - Encouragement
 - Referrals





Power of Mother-to-Mother Connection

- Seek people with shared experiences
- Talk through stressful situations
- Build network of trust





Peer Counselors Make a Difference

- Position of trust
- Complement care
- Added dimension





Model for Breastfeeding

- Positive role model
- Reinforce
 recommendations





Bringing Baby to Clinic

- Infant in arms
- Maintain breastfeeding
- Role Model






Establish Connections

- Recognize challenges





Filling the Gap in Services

- Between hospital discharge and WIC appointment

- Other Medical Situations


Job Settings

WIC Breastfeeding Peer Counselor Program Sites


